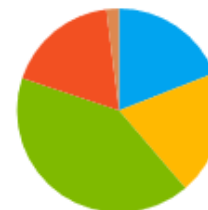

FY 2015 Expenditures



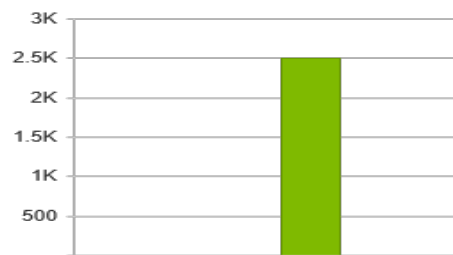
FY 2015 Individuals Served

Executive Summary

Background

The mission of the Title V Program is to protect, promote and improve the health and well-being of women, children, and adolescents, including those with special health care needs. The Title V Program seeks to strengthen the Maternal and Child Health (MCH) infrastructure and to assure the availability, accessibility, and quality of primary and specialty care services for women, children and adolescents.

As Maryland's Title V Maternal and Child Health (MCH) Block Grant Agency, the Maternal and Child Health Bureau (MCHB), provides State leadership to improve the health and well-being of Maryland women, men, infants, children adolescents and their families. MCHB is housed in the Prevention and Health Promotion Administration (PHPA) within the Maryland Department of Health and Mental Hygiene (DHMH). Maryland's Title V Program consists of three offices within MCHB: the Office for Family and Community Health Services (OFCHS), the Office for Genetics and People with Special Health Care Needs (OGPSHCN) and the Office of MCH Epidemiology (OME).

Maryland receives approximately \$11.5 million annually to address ongoing and emerging health care needs for these populations. Federal law stipulates that at least 30% of federal funding is to be spent on preventive and primary care services for children and another 30% on services for children and youth with special health care needs. No more than 10% of funding is to be used for administrative costs. Maryland's grant supports Title V staff at the State and local levels and supports a broad range of services and activities.

This annual report provides an overview of Maryland's Title V MCH Program activities, accomplishments, and innovation. Specific components of this report include a brief summary of Maryland's 2015 Needs Assessment Results, our final State Action plan and an overview and listing of our state's selected priorities, National Performance Measures (NPMs), National Outcome Measures (NOM), State Performance Measures (SPM) and State Outcome Measures (SOM).
